FROM THE PRESIDENT

With the emergence of CoViD-19, it is of paramount importance that we prepare rather than panic. As with any emergency, the State of Hawaii recommends that we keep a 14-day kit of nonperishable food and supplies. There are several small steps that can be taken to minimize risk of infection.

Following everyday preventive actions can prevent or slow down the spread of respiratory illness in the community:

- Get your flu shot. People with seasonal influenza will exhibit similar signs and symptoms as COVID-19 (fever and cough). If more people are protected against influenza, this will reduce confusion and the burden on our healthcare system.
- Wash your hands often with soap and water for at least 20 seconds, especially after going to the bathroom; before eating; and after blowing your nose, coughing, or sneezing.
- If soap and water are not readily available, use an alcohol-based hand sanitizer with at least 60% alcohol. Always wash hands with soap and water if your hands are visibly dirty.
- Avoid touching your eyes, nose, and mouth.
- · Avoid close contact with people who are sick.
- · Stay home if you start to feel ill.
- Cover your cough or sneeze with a tissue, then throw the tissue in the trash.
- Clean and disinfect frequently touched objects and surfaces using a regular household cleaning spray or wipe.
 Stay vigilant and stay healthy, everyone.

Our membership is made up of some of the most talented professionals on the planet. We are able to visualize, engineer, create and perform our way through any obstacles.




