

Aloha, 665 Kin,

August has already been a whirlwind, no pun intended. Hurricane Douglas missed us by the skin of our teeth, spurring the emergency cancellation of last month's GMM. It should go without saying that we'll have a lot to discuss at this month's General Membership meeting.

100 years ago today, on August 18th, 1920, Tennessee became the 36th state to ratify the 19th amendment to the US Constitution, clearing the last obstacle of obtaining the agreement of three-fourths of the states, and guaranteeing American women the right to vote. This law would go on to enfranchise 26 million voters across the United States. It did not, however, include Native American, Hispanic American, Asian American, nor African American women - many of whom would continue to fight for their right to vote well through the Civil Rights movement. The obstacles and hurdles on our path to participate in our civic duty have been and continue to be intentional.

The hindrances that have been placed in front of today's voters are almost too incredible to believe. The USPS does not lose money. It's a service, much like the US Coast Guard is a service. And yet, there have been active and abhorrent efforts by the current US administration to hamstring the US Postal service ahead of this year's election. An election that, by-and-large, requires mail-in (a.k.a. absentee) ballots to prevent unnecessary exposure to CoViD-19. With the conclusion of the Primary Election, the landscape of the General Election of 2020 has become clear. It is imperative that we mobilize our membership to vote.

Luckily, we've still got a fighting chance. 21 State Attorneys General have stated that they will contest the planned changes to the USPS. For voters, digital resources are readily available to anyone who seeks them. I'm inspired by suffragettes like Mary B. Talbert, Nannie Helen Burroughs, and Emma Nawahi who fought tirelessly for their right, and the right of others like them, to vote. The General election is 77 days from 08/18/2020. It will pass quicker than you think. Have a plan and vote early.

Aloha, Brothers, Sisters, Kin -

Today, August 18th, 2020, marks the 100th Anniversary of adding the 19th Amendment to the U.S. Constitution, allowing women the Right to Vote.

ELECTIONS: We are so proud of the record number of voters who mailed in their ballots for the primary election! It's not too late to register to vote in November. The IA 665 Political Action Committee will be vetting local candidates for consideration for the General Election. Your VOTE is your VOICE. Use it.

COVID-19: Two steps forward, one step back. A couple of months ago, Hawai'i was lauded for our very low COVID-19 confirmed case rate. Now, we are in the national news for triple-digit spikes. On top of that, prisoners will be released due to the outbreak at Halawa, and I hear RIMPAC is still coming even though the Governor has threatened to shutdown the town again. We just can't catch a break.

It'll take more than a pandemic to keep us down.

QUARANTINE: Effective immediately until October 1st, Governor Ige has extended the mandatory quarantine for anyone traveling from O'ahu to the neighbor-islands, and beaches and parks are still off limits.

SAFETY NEGOTIATIONS: After two months of discussions, the COVID-19 safety negotiations between the national entertainment unions (IATSE, SAG-AFTRA, DGA and Teamsters) and the Hollywood employers appear to be drawing to a close. The IATSE International is adopting a Zero Tolerance policy for wearing PPE at work. Not wearing your mask while working will be grounds for termination.

TESTING, TESTING: Several of our members have been called back to finish wrapping up "Hawai" Five-O" and to start prepping "Magnum P.I.". That has required initial COVID-19 testing weeks ahead of being hired, prescreening surveys, daily temperature checks and weekly testing at a minimum. This will be the new normal for us. Everything is going to be slowed way down so that we can take proper care to sanitize our hands, equipment and work surfaces.

MASKS: Back in June, our 665 sewing crew made hundreds of masks for Queens Hospital. They loved the quality so much that they asked if we could make another 700 for their retirees. We agreed! They supplied us with Queens logo cotton fabric, spools of thread and elastic. Kathe James had the brilliant idea to purchase lining material so we could make more masks with the logo fabric, so we did. We will be able to donate more than 1,000 masks when all is said and done. Mahalo to Kathe James, Michael Tereschuk, Cathie Valdovino, Terri Laigo, Ivy Rowan, Cory Ching, Lani Roberts, Karen Archibald, Ande Hambuchen, Jessica Asing, Kim Tripp and Susanna Chan for sewing the masks. In exchange for their time, they will be recognized by Queens Hospital as VIP Volunteers at their annual luncheon.

FOOD DISTRIBUTION: All of the volunteers who come out to help at the food distribution every Thursday in Kalaeloa and on Maui are considered essential workers. MAHALO to the many volunteers who have helped sustain our 665 'Ohana and members of the community during this challenging time.

STIMULUS MONEY: At this writing, the U.S. Senate still has not approved when the second round of CARES Act stimulus money will be rolling out. In fact, they went on a break. During a pandemic. Remember in November. If you have not received your first round of stimulus money, you have until September 30th to file for it. Go to IRS.gov for more information.

In closing, stay healthy. Be smart. Be safe. We need you.






UNITY & SAFETY – Getting Back to Work

The Industry White Paper (June 1, 2020) "...offered the foundation for the appropriate state agencies to examine the resumption of production, and provides guidance **Employers must follow to provide a safe working environment**, it expressly contemplated that specific protocols regarding mandatory testing, personal protective equipment (PPE), and department-specific procedures would be the subject of further discussions and agreement between the producers and the unions" (SagAftra.org).

Moving forward, Unions and Guilds in consultation with leading epidemiologists and experts "set forth key components of those detailed protocols with the release 'The Safe Way Forward' Joint Report from the DGA, SAG-AFTRA, IATSE, and Teamsters on COVID-19 Safety Guidelines to Provide Safe Workplaces in a Pre-Vaccine World (June 12, 2020) provided "department-specific procedures" that "would be the subject of further discussions and agreement between the producers and the unions" (SagAftra.org).

CRAFT SPECIFIC LOCALS APPOINTED



The IATSE appointed Craft Specific Locals including IATSE Local 706 Make-up Artists and Hairstylist Guild. On July 8, 2020, The IATSE Local 706 Safety Task Force released the "Make-up, Hair & Prosthetic Back-to-Work COVID-19 Safety Guidelines" adopted by Local 798/New York, Local 476/Chicago, Local 863/Montreal, Locals 822 and 873/Toronto and Local 891/Vancouver, Canada. The IATSE Local 706 Task Force unanimously decided to share this document with their recommendations to any/all Locals in need of these safety guidelines (local706.org).

Other IATSE Locals were appointed to create Craft Specific Safety Guidelines including Motion Picture Costumers IATSE Local 705 And Costume Designers Guild IATSE Local 892, https://www.motionpicturecostumers.org/ and IATSE Local 80 Grips Television Production Back to Work Proposal, Rigging Keys Working Group Back to Work Recommendations, and Crafts Service Protocols Working Group (July 28, 2020), https://www.iatselocal80.org/. The IATSE Stagecraft Safety Committee "COVID Reopening Recovery Plan" (July 22, 2020) lists safety protocols in reference for Theaters and Live Performance Venues and applicable to "other facilities in which the various crafts Stagecraft Department workers also work" (https://iatsecares.org/).

CORONAVIRUS (COVID-19) TIPS



Coronavirus Active Response and Engagement Service

SYMPTOMS Individuals with COVID-19 should not work. The most common symptoms of COVID-19 are fever, cough, and shortness of breath. However, other symptoms may include sore throat, fatigue, muscle aches and pains, and decreased appetite. COVID-19 is primarily spread through person-to-person contact.

STAY HEALTHY



20 seconds

Wash your hands throughout the day with soap & water for 20 seconds, including at the beginning, during, & end of your work call and before & after meal breaks. Wash your hands after using the restroom. Hand sanitizer is recommended if washing with soap is not available. Hand sanitizer is not effective on heavily soiled hands.



Cough and sneeze into tissues (or elbows if needed) and immediately dispose of tissues.



To the degree possible, maintain 6 feet/2 metres of distance between coworkers & avoid close physical contact, such as shaking hands.





Wear disposable gloves, a face covering (mask), and other PPE as recommended for your duties AND when unable to maintain a distance of 6 feet/2 metres apart from others AND when interacting with the public.



Avoid touching your mouth, nose, and eyes.



Disinfect personal objects you need to bring to your job, such as cell phones, keys, and tools.



Do not share tools and equipment before sanitizing them.

PREVENT THE SPREAD OF COVID-19



Do your part to regularly clean & disinfect surfaces that you frequently touch such as doorknobs, handles, tables, and shared equipment such as tools and vehicles. Wash hands for 20 seconds with soap & water after cleaning.



If you are sick with COVID-19 symptoms, you should not go to work. Call your doctor, or, in case of a health emergency, call 911 and notify the 911 operator of any COVID-19 symptoms.



Open windows and doors to increase fresh air in rooms and hallways whenever possible.



If you suspect that you may have had contact with someone with COVID-19, let your supervisor know immediately.



To the degree possible, stagger the use of common areas, such as breakrooms, trucks and trailers, and dressing areas.



If you or a family member test positive for COVID-19, follow your doctor's orders.


