

A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT, TUIA'AINA SCANLAN

Aloha kākou,

It's been a quick turnaround since the last meeting! Election day has come and gone. I want to thank each and every one of you that engaged in the political process. A record 69.6% or eligible voters cast their ballots in the 2020 General Election, breaking the record of 68.6% of eligible voters participating in the 1998 election.

Earlier this summer, I took part in a series of one-on-one interviews and Talk Story sessions as a part of a group called "The Emerging Leaders of Hawaii". At the time, a handful of people expressed concern as to why I would participate in, what seemed to them, a frivolous use of the President's time. Now, however, some of these candidates have been elected to the County or State offices which they sought. We hope to build on these relationships as we head into the 2021 Legislative session, which will be entirely virtual. It will be interesting, to say the least.

There are numerous opportunities for training available online through the IATSE Training Trust Fund. The "Safety First! Online Courses ©" contain numerous subjects of training from which every member can benefit. These courses range from Elevated Work Platforms to Biological Hazards. There is no need to take the courses in any particular order, but once the course is started, you must complete the course before moving on to another. These courses do *not* result in certification. "Motion Picture TV Online Safety (ASA)", however, is also known as the Safety Pass Online Courses provided by Contract Services. I know it can be confusing, as I was previously confused by the difference myself. These courses are only available to those members performing work under the Area Standards Agreement. As these courses are made available by CSATF, some of the laws referenced are specific to California. Still, the overarching lessons to be gleaned from them are applicable regardless of where you live. This is where you'll find "A" – General Safety Training, "A2" – Environmental Safety, and "HP1" – Harassment Prevention 1 or "HP2" – Harassment Prevention 2 Safety Pass online courses. Lastly, in an effort to keep the member abreast of my work, starting this November 2020 GM Meeting, I will add the President's Report to the monthly agenda. In this way, there will be a regularly scheduled reporting of the activities of the office of the President. 




